
Entries in tsunami poster competition tell of fear, hope and compassion

WHILE MANY young artists of varying skill levels and artistic backgrounds participated in the Asian Disaster Preparedness Centre's (ADPC) poster competition, their perceptions of the great tragedy expressed similar themes.

Hope, compassion and the human spir-it, along with the understandable presence of devastation and tears, factored into most of the works submitted by students for the competition to mark the one-year anniversary of the tsunami.

In a ceremony to announce the winners held yesterday at Chulalongkorn University, ADPC executive director Suvit Yodmani said the contest would go a long way in helping his organisation raise public awareness concerning school category went to Leela Deechaiyaset of Satree Wittaya School.
