

## MASS CASUALTY MANAGEMENT SIMULATION EXERCISE

Udonthani Province

01 June 2006

The Asian Disaster Preparedness Center (ADPC) represented by John Abo, Technical Manager of the Public Health in Emergencies Team together with Benjaporn Suthripapa, Coordinator of Training & Resource Group was invited by Udonthani Hospital with funding support from Sor Sor Sor (Health Building Support Office) to observe and evaluate the Mass Casualty Simulation Exercise. The simulation exercise was organized by Udonthani provincial government and was held on the 1<sup>st</sup> of June 2006 in Udonthani.

The scenario of the exercise was a vehicular accident involving a bus and a truck, which resulted in multiple casualties at the site of the accident. The goal of the exercise was to test the mass casualty management plan of the city involving multi sectoral response. The exercise was joined by the health sector represented by the different hospitals including the army hospital, DDPM provincial office, police, volunteers, foundations, fire department, rescue, local government organizations, and others.
